The Council is registered under section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013 as not for profit entity. Hence, no dividend can be declared by the Council.

Material Changes and Commitments

No material changes and commitments affecting the financial position of the Council occurred between the end of the financial year to which this financial statement relates and the date of this report.

Conservation of Energy, Technology Absorption, Foreign Exchange Earnings & Outgo

1. Conservation of Energy, Technology Absorption

The particulars as required under the provision of Section 134(3)(m) of the Companies Act, 2013 in respect of conservation of energy and technology absorption have not been furnished considering the nature of activities undertaken by the Council during the year under review.

2. Foreign Exchange Earnings and Outgo

During the financial year 2020-21, the foreign exchange earnings of the Council amounted to Re. 0 as against Rs. 11749925/- in the previous year. The expenditure in foreign exchange during the financial year was Rs. 3058314/- as compared to Rs. 28311062/- in the previous year.

Loan, Guarantees or Investments

Particulars of loans given, investment made, guarantees given, if any, and the purpose for which the loan or guarantee and investment is proposed to be utilised are provided in the standalone financial statement in note nos 2.7 & 2.12.

Extract of Annual Return

In accordance with Section 134(3)(a) of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 12 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014, an extract of the Annual Return for the financial year ended 31st March, 2021 in Form MGT-9 is appended as **Annexure-1** to the Working Committee Report.

Internal Financial Control and Its Adequacy

The Council has a proper and adequate internal control system commensurate with its nature of activities and meets the following objectives:

- providing assurance regarding the effectiveness and efficiency of operations;
- efficient use and safeguarding of resources;
- compliance with policies, procedures and applicable laws and regulations; and
- transactions being accurately recorded and promptly reported.

The members of the Working Committee regularly review the adequacy of internal control system.

Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)

Provisions relating to CSR, as contained in section 135 of Companies Act 2013, were not applicable to the Council for the current financial year.



Committee Responsibility Statement

As stipulated in section 134(3)(c) of the Companies Act, 2013, your Committee subscribes to the "Committee Responsibility Statement" and confirms as under:

- 3) That the Committee has taken proper and sufficient care for the maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 for safeguarding the assets of the Council and for preventing and detecting fraud and other irregularities;
- 4) That the Committee has prepared the Annual Accounts of the Council on a going concern basis;
- 5) That the Committee has laid down internal financial controls to be followed by the Council and such internal financial controls are adequate and were operating effectively; and
- 6) That the Committee has devised proper systems to ensure proper compliance with the provisions of all applicable laws and that such systems were adequate and operating effectively.

Auditors and Auditors' Report

Statutory Auditors

Under Section 139 of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Rules made thereunder, it is mandatory to rotate the statutory auditors on completion of the maximum term permitted under the provisions of Companies Act, 2013. In line with the requirements of the Companies Act, 2013, M/s. Ranjit Jain & Co., Chartered Accountants, as the statutory auditors of the Council for a period five consecutive years from the conclusion of the ensuing 64th AGM till the conclusion of the 69th AGM to be held in the year 2024. The requirement for the annual ratification of auditors' appointment at the AGM has been omitted pursuant to Companies (Amendment) Act, 2017 notified on May 7, 2018.

During the year, the statutory auditors have confirmed that they satisfy the independence criteria required under the Companies Act, 2013 and Code of ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

Committee's comment on the Auditors' Report

The observations of the Statutory Auditors, when read together with the relevant notes to the accounts and accounting policies are self-explanatory. There are no qualification, reservation or adverse remark or disclaimer made by the said auditors in their report.

Cost Records and Cost Audit

Maintenance of cost records and requirement of cost audit as prescribed under the provisions of section148(1) of the Companies Act, 2013 are not applicable for the activities carried out by the Council.

Number of meetings of the Working Committee

During the year, the Council held four Working Committee Meetings on 3rd July 2020, 24th August, 2020, 4th December, 2020 and 24th March, 2021 respectively. The necessary quorum was present for all the meetings. The intervening gap between any two meetings was within the period prescribed by the Companies Act, 2013.



Significant and Material Orders, if any

During the year, there were no significant and material orders passed by the regulators or courts or tribunals impacting the going concern status and the Council's operation in future.

Reporting of Frauds by Auditors

During the year under review, the Auditors had not reported to the Working Committee any matter under section 143(12) of the Companies Act, 2013, any instances of fraud committed against the Company by its officers or employees, the details of which would need to be mentioned in the Report of Working Committee [i.e. the Board].

Prevention of Sexual Harassment at Workplace

As per requirement of The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition & Redressal) Act, 2013 and Rules made thereunder, your Council has constituted Internal Complaints Committee (ICC). During the year, No complaints were received by the Council.

Compliance with Secretarial Standards

The Council is in compliance with the applicable Secretarial Standards issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India and approved by the Central Government under section 118(10) of the Act.

Particulars of Employees

There was no employee of the council who received remuneration in excess of the limit prescribed under section 197 of the Companies Act, 1956 read with Rule 5 of the Companies (Appointment and Remuneration) Rules, 2014.

Global Health Pandemic from COVID-19

The World Health Organization has declared Novel Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) to be a global pandemic. In enforcing social distancing to contain the spread of this disease, our offices all over India have been operating with minimal staff by shifting our focus from physical mode to virtual mode, wherever feasible, for carrying out our various export promotional activities. In keeping with its employee-safety first approach, the Company quickly instituted measures for their well-being. Our teams reacted with speed and efficiency, and quickly leveraged technology to shift the workforce to an entirely new 'work-from-home' model. Proactive preparations were done in our work locations during this transition to ensure our offices and technology centers were safe. Policy changes related to working from home and IT infrastructure support were rolled out overnight to help our employees shift to this new work paradigm. Continuous communication on the latest updates played a key role in enabling our employees to stay on top of the evolving situation.

There are still many unknowns today and hence, the near-term outlook is extremely uncertain. We stand united with the nation in the fight against COVID-19 as we navigate our way through these uncertain times together. Our focus remains on safety of our people, taking necessary steps to protect and promote exports of engineering products from the country. Despite the near-term ambiguity, we remain confident of the medium to long-term growth prospects of the Engineering sector. We are working closely with Governments to ensure that we overcome this global health crisis together.

As a responsible member of the communities that it operates in, EEPC India has contributed to various COVID-19 relief and monitoring programs in India. Contributions made here will be channelized through suitable government agencies.

The Company's focus on liquidity, supported by a strong balance sheet and acceleration in cost optimization initiatives, would help in navigating any near-term challenges in the present economic environment.

EXPORT PERFORMANCE

The Working Committee of EEPC INDIA has the pleasure in presenting its report on the activities of EEPC India for the year ended 31st March, 2021.

A. OVERALL EXPORTS DOWN BY 7.08% DURING APRIL-MARCH 2021

Based on the provisional data published by DGCl&S Cumulative value of exports for the period April-March 2020-21 was US\$ 291163.54 Million (Rs.2154339.24 Crore) as against US\$ 313361.04 Million (Rs.2219854.18 Crore) registering a negative growth of 7.08 per cent in Dollar terms and 2.95 per cent in Rupee terms over the same period last year.

B. PERFORMANCE OF ENGINEERING SECTOR IN FY 2020-21

According to the provisional data available from DGCl&S up to March 2021, India's export of engineering goods have registered a negative growth of 2.95% in US\$ mln during the financial year 2020-21 in comparison to the same period in the previous fiscal. The provisional data indicates the exports of engineering goods from India have reached 73119.6 US\$ mln up to March 2021 in comparison to 75344.41 US\$ mln in the previous fiscal.

In rupee terms India's export of engineering goods are valued at Rs. 543174.06 Crores during April-March 2020-21 which is 1.64% higher than Rs. 534370.43 Crores during April-March 2019-20.

The engineering sector appears to retain its share around 25.11% in overall export from the country, which is maximum in terms of sectoral contribution.

Covid 19 puts brakes on automobile, auto parts exports in May: EEPC India

Kolkata, Jun 26 (UNI) C-19 public health crisis has taken a massive toll on exports of India's automobiles in May, 2020 with as much annualised erosion as 48 per cent and 65 per cent in shipments to key markets like the US and Mexico respectively, according to an EEPC India

Exports of auto components too suffered a major setback in May, 2020 with key markets including the US, Mexico, Germany and Japan reporting de-growth ranging between 34 per cent and 68 per cent , year-on year.

The total exports of auto components and parts recorded 65.5 per cent negative growth during May 2020, moving down from USD 473.6 million in May 2019 to USD 163.2 million in May this

While the raw material price is harring the manufacturers, the recent jump in freight charges on imported goods due to limited availability of containers has worsened the situation. The price of hot rolled coil, an essential raw material for the engineering from Res 55000 a tonice to Regimering Export Promotion Council of India.

India net exporter of agri-machinery equipment to some advanced countries: EEPC

Rising steel prices hit engineering exports'

New Delhi, November 18

The Engineering Export Promotion Council (EEPC) of India has raised concerns about a recent sharp rise in steel

According to the council, this rise impacts India's engineering exports that are facing challenging global markets in the face of another wave of Covid-19 pandemic in several major economies.

"Engineering exporters are deeply concerned over rising steel prices. The prices have increased from ₹35,000 per tonne to ₹42,000 in the past six months for a product like Hot Rolled Coil, an essential raw material for the engineering industry," said Chairman of EEPC India, Mahesh Desai.

Desai said that prices of other essential metals have also been rising disproportionate to the end-product prices that can be realised in the international markets, becoming more and more tough. This is because major markets of Europe are weathering a second wave of coronavirus while the US is reeling from the deadly impact of the pandemic.

He appealed to the Centre to impress upon the large steel manufacturers to keep prices in check.

"We urge the government to take up these issues to stabilise raw material prices as our member-exporters are facing deleterious impact," he said.

According to EEPC, India's engineering exports have declined by 14 per cent from \$44.43 billion during April-October 2019-20 to \$38.14 billion in the same period of the current financial year.

India net exporter of agri equipment to some countries: EEPC

India has emerged as a net exporter of agri-machinery to some of the advanced countries like the US, the UK, Germany and Italy, an engineering export body said on Monday. Engineering Export Promotion Council (EEPC) India vice chairman Arun Garodia said in a statement, tractors are the largest component of the agrimachinery exports from the country, accounting for 66 per cent of the shipments.

POLICY MATTERS

The rapid spread of COVID-19 across the globe and the subsequent imposition of lockdowns by several countries including India had a severe impact on merchandise as well as engineering exports. While the previous year has been disastrous for the global economy reeling under the COVID 19 pandemic, quarter 4 of 2020-21, has recorded some recovery and the decline was reduced by around 9% as per the UNCTAD Global Trade Update of February, 2021. However the recovery has not been even and South-South trade still remain below average. Therefore while global trade is showing some signs of recovery, we need to take a cautious approach. In this respect we are also grateful to the government for providing us support in this difficult time.

A. Impact of Coronavirus

1. Facilitating transportation

The major issue that the exporters faced during the lockdown was the closure of all transportation and allied port services and their export offices and manufacturing facilities. Consequently several exporters faced problems in fulfilling their existing orders as they could not transport their final products or raw materials to and from the port. EEPC India raised this issue in March with the government upon which the Ministry of Home Affairs in their order dated 15.04.2020 lifted restrictions on movement, loading/unloading of goods and cargo, both inter and intra state. These included operations of railways, airports and sea ports. Land ports and inland container depots for cargo transport.

Another issue raised by the Council was the shutdown of operations of courier companies which hampered the transportation of key export documents. These restrictions were also lifted in the same order.

2. Operationalisation of export offices and manufacturing units

The issue of operationalisation of key export offices, CHA offices and manufacturing units was also raised by the Council in the representation. Consequently the MHA in their order dated 15th April lifted restrictions on the operations of export units located in SEZs, EOUs and other industrial areas albeit with restrictions.

3. Extension of Exemption of 5% GST on Export Freight

As per the Notification No. 21/2019-Central Tax (Rate) of September, a 5% exemption on GST on services by way of transportation of goods by an aircraft/ vessel from customs station of clearance in India to a place outside India was extended to September 2020. Earlier it was exempted only up to September 30, 2019.

EEPC India had further requested to extend this exemption of 5% GST on export freight for another year, till September 30, 2021 at least, so that exporters were not further burdened with the increasing freight that they have to pay on account of the acute shortage of Shipping containers.

B. Union Budget 2021-22

The Union budget was announced on 1st February, 2021. It is heartening to mention that many of EEPC India's suggestions had been included. Some of the major changes with respect to engineering were:

- a. In case of steel products melting scrap including stainless steel scrap BCD reduced from 2.5% to nil
- b. BCD on steel products like semis, flat and long products of non-alloy, alloy and stainless steel reduced to 7.5% for 10/12.5%
- c. Raw materials used in the manufacture of CRGO steel BCD reduced from 2.5% to nil
- d. Copper scrap BCD from 5% to 2.5%
- e. Revocation/temporary revocation and discontinuance of AD and CVD on HRC, flat products of stainless steel. CRC of SS,
- f. In capital goods and machinery, BCD has been raised for tunnel boring machines from zero to 7.5% and parts and components of such machines from nil to 2.5%
- g. In case of certain auto products duties raised from 7.5%/10% to 15%
- h. For screws and nuts, BCD increased from 10% to 15%
- i. Compressors BCD increased from 12.5% to 15%
- j. Insulated cables and wires BCD increased from 7.5% to 10%
- k. Solar inverters from 5% to 20%
- I. Solar lanterns or solar lamps from 5% to 15%

Other schemes that may impact the engineering value chain are —

- m. Voluntary Vehicle Scrappage Policy Scheme: Under the Scheme, personal and commercial vehicles will have to undergo fitness tests after 20 years and 15 years respectively to pave the way for phase out of old and polluting vehicles. This will boost the sales of the automobile industry.
- n. Interest Equalization Scheme for Labour intensive and MSME Sector: Allocation of Rs 1900 crore (which is less than the BE of 2021). This will help in the lowering Rupee Export Credit for Exporters.

C. FTP related

RODTEP

Following the withdrawal of MEIS, the RODTEP scheme was implemented on January 1st, 2021. While the final rates are yet to be announced by the Committee under the chairmanship of Dr. G K Pillai, the government decided on a crediting a provisional rate of 0.5%. While EEPC welcomed the implementation of the scheme, it also raised the following points — for engineering product the minimum RODTEP rate should be 2%. EEPC also suggested that for continuity of Scheme of Supply of steel at Export parity price, exports against ARO should be eligible for RODTEP as it is indigenously produced Raw material and has elements of Duties and Taxes which are refunded through RODTEP. Further, EEPC India also requested to use the benefit of RODTEP for payment of IGST apart from only Import duty.



Inclusion of SEZ and EOU under the RoDTEP Scheme (Remission of Duties or Taxes on Export Products) to entail cost-competitiveness for Indian exports

EEPC India whole heartedly welcomed the Finance Ministry's announcement for implementation of RoDTEP Scheme and extending benefit to all export goods w.e.f. 1st January, 2021. However, there was an uncertainty arising for SEZs and EOUs that exports from these units will not be eligible to avail the benefit of RoDTEP Scheme. The current modifications made in the online mechanism for accepting and processing RoDTEP claims provides no provision for SEZs and EOUs for availing the benefit of the RoDTEP Scheme and not able to file for claiming RoDTEP in the shipping bill or bill of export. EEPC India requested the government for inclusion of SEZs and EOUs under the RoDTEP Scheme, and extending the RoDTEP rates to the exports made from these units as are applicable for domestic units.

EPCG and Advance Authorisation

With respect to EPCG and Advance Authorization cases, there should be a settlement scheme like the Sabka Vikas scheme for Excise and Service Tax. In the case EPCG and Advance Authorization, the Settlement scheme should allow only the waiver of interest and penalty while the exporter would fulfil the entire duty liability

Interest Equalization

As the Union Budget 2021-22 has provided for Rs.1900 crores, EEPC India requested the government to extend the interest equalization with effect from April 01, 2021 at the earliest

MEIS

The MEIS benefit of over Rs.35000 crores for 2019-20 and April-December 2020 should be kindly released at the earliest. Further the government also should provide some clarity as to whether the RODTEP rates once announced will be applicable on the exports made between January 2020 and March 2020.

Request for Export credit at Repo Rate plus 2.2 percent

On 26th May 2020, under the Chairmanship of the Honourable CIM a VC meeting was held as a follow-up action of the ROD. EEPC India raised the following issues in the meeting.

- (i) The Nirvik Scheme has been notified. The need now is for the RBI to issue a Circular to the Banks for providing for the Repo Rate plus 2.2 percent for pre— & post shipment interest charges.
- (ii) Waiver of Penal Interest rates being charged by the Banks for delayed receipt of the overseas payments during this Covid period.
- (iii) Problems of Risky Exporters & delays in Drawback/ IGST Refunds (not strictly a banking issue but pertains to the Finance Ministry).

D. Steel at export parity price

EEPC India welcomed the Steel at Export Parity Price scheme. It was also suggested that the steel companies who supply steel at the Export Parity Price should be given all the benefits under the Export Parity Price scheme as they get for physical exports. Further, the DGFT should provide the Export Parity Price based on DGC&IS FOB data for all the four products (HRC/CRC/Wire Rods/Bars) at present. In addition, all major steel producers should be included in the Export Parity Price scheme as currently only 6 (six) primary steel producers are under the scheme. It was also suggested that apart from the four above mentioned products other steel products like billets which are used by the MSME sector should be covered under the Export Parity Scheme.



E. Coal Import Monitoring Scheme

DGFT via Notification No 49/2015-2020 dated 22nd December 2020 intimated the implementation of Coal Import Monitoring Scheme for February 1st, 2021. The notification further mentioned that the facility for online registration for the same would start from December 31st, 2020. However, EEPC India has received member feedback that the registration facility has not been activated. Furthermore the members have also requested shortening of the registration time to 5 days. EEPC India had conveyed the same to the Government.

F. Enhancing Exports of Automobiles from India

EEPC India had provided its recommendations to the ministry on enhancing exports of automobiles from India. EEPC had suggested several countries and regions with untapped potential for Indian automobile where exports can be increased substantially through negotiation of FTAs or PTAs.

G. Certificate of Origin

The DGFT launched a common digital platform for issuing non preferential certificate of origin (CoO). According to a recent Trade Notice No 42/2020-21 dated 19th February 2021, DGFT would issue online CoOs w.e.f 01/04/2021 as per the provisions of para 2.108 of Handbook and Procedure.

H. EU Safeguard on certain Cast Iron Articles

The European Union (EU) introduced steel safeguard measures on 26 product categories in July 2018 for a period of three years after the U.S. imposed similar tariffs based on national security in March 2018. The safeguard measures were set to expire in June 2021. On January 15, 2021, the European Commission (Commission) received a request by 12 Member States to examine whether the current safeguard measures should be extended. On February 25, 2021, the Commission found the request contains evidence suggesting that the safeguard measures continue to be necessary and constitutes sufficient basis to initiate an investigation. However, from the trade figures it is evident that the EU is no longer incurring serious injury (if it ever did since the original investigation, quod non) and Union Producers are no longer adjusting to third-country steel imports. Additionally the prolongation of the measure should be limited to the minimum possible duration under the EU Safeguard Regulation and by duly justifying the time required for the (wrongly) alleged ongoing adjustment of the Union industry.

Accordingly exporting members of EEPC has requested the government to take up matters with the commission. It is suggested that Indian exports (especially SS Bar & SS Wire rods) should not have been included in the safeguard measures imposed, or at least, that the quantitative duty-free quotas should be considerably larger in view of the Union's increased consumption and upward pressure on prices, a consequence of increased demand and shortage of supply.

I. EU AD investigation on certain Cast Iron Articles exported from India

The European Commission received a petition for initiating anti-dumping investigation on certain cast iron articles exported from India. EEPC India had discussed with the concerned members and took the issue forward.

J. Argentina's AD investigation on Ball Bearings exported from India

We were intimated by one of our member exporters that Argentina has declared an AD investigation over Indian "Ball bearings, radial, single row ball, with an outer diameter greater than or equal to 30 mm but less than or equal to 120 mm, and of more than 0.025 kg / unit, except: types such as RST and extended inner ring. EEPC India had intimated its concerned members.



K. Listing of Indian Products under the Child Labour and Forced Labour by U.S. Dept of Labour

A meeting between officials of EOI, Washington D C and Bureau of International labor Affairs, U.S. Dept, of Labor's was held on 31st July, 2020 in Washington D C USA. The US side while reiterating the set process for removing any item from the list, agreed that products having dated references or less than 10 references such as Locks could be worked up to lead to their removal from the list.

In this regard, the US DoL officials agreed for holding virtual meetings with relevant stakeholders in India. The US side would be providing a tentative list of the stakeholders that they would like to meet during these virtual meeting. EEPC India had examined the issue in consultation with the industry to prepare for the proposed meetings with their relevant documents.

L. Risky Exporter alert

Some of the leading member exporters engaged in the manufacturing of engineering goods had been under immense financial crunch in respect of pending refunds (Duty drawback & IGST) on account of being classified as risky exporters from the past more than a year making it difficult for them to sustain their businesses. EEPC India had taken up the issue with DOC several times to help its members.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT & ACCOUNTS

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of EEPC INDIA (Company Limited by Guarantee) ("the Council") which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2021, the Statement of Income & Expenditure and the Cash Flow Statement for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 ('Act') in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Council as at March 31, 2021, its surplus and Cash Flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the standards on auditing specified under section 143 (10) of the Companies Act, 2013. We are independent of the council in accordance with the code of ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the rules thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the code of ethics.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

Reporting of key audit matters as per SA 701, Key Audit Matters are not applicable to the Council as it is an unlisted company.

Information other than the financial statements and Auditors' Report thereon

The Council's Working Committee is responsible for the preparation of the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Report of the Working Committee including Annexures to the Working Committee's Report but does not include the financial statements and our Auditors' Report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the standalone financial statements or our knowledge obtained during the course of our audit or otherwise appears to be materially mis-stated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.



Responsibilities of Management and those charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

The Council's Working Committee is responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") with respect to the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of the Council in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the accounting standards specified under section 133 of the Act. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding of the assets of the Council and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statement that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with SAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with SAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and
 perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a
 basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting
 from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our Auditors' Report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Council to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.



We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

- 1. This report does not include a statement on the matters specified in paragraph 3 and 4 of the Companies (Auditor's Report) Order, 2016, issued by the Central Government of India in terms of sub-section (11) of section 143 of the Companies Act, 2013, since in our opinion and according to the information and explanation given to us, the said order is not applicable to the Council, which is a Company licensed to operate under section 25 of the Companies Act, 1956.
- 2. As required by section 143 (3) of the Act, we report that:
 - a) We have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purposes of our audit;
 - b) In our opinion, proper books of account as required by law have been kept by the Council so far as appears from our examination of those books;
 - c) The Balance Sheet, the Statement of Income and Expenditure and the Cash Flow statement dealt with by this Report are in agreement with the books of account;
 - d) In our opinion, the aforesaid financial statements comply with the Accounting Standards specified under section 133 of the Act, read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014;
 - e) As reported to us, we report that none of the members of the Working Committee is disqualified as on 31st March,2021 from being appointed as a member of the Working Committee in terms of section 164(2) of the Companies Act, 2013;
 - f) With respect to the adequacy of the internal financial controls over financial reporting of the Council and the operating effectiveness of such controls, refer to our separate report in **Annexure A**; and
 - g) With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor's Report in accordance with Rule 11 of the Companies (Audit & Auditors) Rules, 2014, in our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us:
 - i) The Council does not have any pending litigations which would impact its financial position.
 - ii) The Council did not have any such long-term contracts including derivatives contracts for which there were any material foreseeable losses.

NOTE-1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- 1.1. Expenses/Income, especially those relating to specific projects, are accounted for in the year for which budget approval has been granted and not necessarily in the year of incurrence of expenditure. Any payment/receipt on that account is kept under advances/liabilities till the year of budget approval.
- 1.2. Expenditure related to various Code and other specific activities are booked under those functional heads to conform to the budgets approved by the Government of India. As such, expenses shown under various natural heads are not necessarily the total expenditure incurred under these particular heads.
- 1.3. The subscription income from members is not taken into account unless received except in cases where the GST invoice was raised for such subscription.
- 1.4. Items of printing and stationery are charged to Statement of Income & Expenditure of the year in which the same are purchased.
- 1.5. Pursuant to the policy adopted by the management in 1982-83, the expenditure on Publication is directly charged to Income & Expenditure account and no stock of publications at the end of the year is accounted for, as these are considered purely export promotional literature
- 1.6. The interest received/accrued on the earmarked fixed deposits of Export Development Fund with banks has been directly credited to the Export Development Fund.
- 1.7. Provision for Gratuity & Leave Encashment is based on actuarial valuation on the present value of future liability which includes Rs.59,14,213/- being interest on earmarked investments of Gratuity & Leave Encashment fund directly credited to the Provision for Gratuity & Leave Encashment Account.
- 1.8. Till 31.03.2014, the depreciation was being provided under the W.D.V. method at the rates prescribed under schedule XIV of the Companies Act, 1956. From the financial year 2014-15 the depreciation is being provided on the basis of the useful lives of the fixed assets prescribed under Schedule-II of the Companies Act, 2013.
- 1.9. Foreign Currency Transaction:

Transactions through the foreign currency bank accounts maintained by the Council have been transacted at the standard fixed rates adopted for the year and not at the actual rate prevailing on the date of transaction. The other transactions in foreign currency have been accounted for at the actual rates prevailing on the date of transaction.



NOTE-3: OTHER EXPLANATORY INFORMATION

- 3.1. Every member of the Council other than the Officials of Government undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Council in the event of the same being wound up during the time that he was a member or within one year afterwards, for payment of the debts and liabilities of the Council contracted prior to the date on which he ceases to be a member and the costs, charges and expenses of winding up the same and the adjustment of the right of the contributories among themselves, such amount as may be required not exceeding Rs.1,000/- in the case of Ordinary Members and Rs.50/- in the case of Associate Members.
- 3.2. A sum of Rs. 55,88,310/- has been transferred during the year from the Building Fund Account to the Statement of Income & Expenditure. This Building Fund was created out of the Income of the Council in past years for the purposes of acquiring premises at different places in India for carrying out its export promotional activities. Out of this fund, the aforesaid sum of Rs.55,88,310/- had remained unutilized at the end of the current financial year. Since there is no plan as of now to acquire any new premises, it was decided to transfer this unutilized portion of Building Fund at the year-end to the Statement of Income & Expenditure, as the same was no longer required.
- 3.3 Secured Loans to employees for house building and purchase of vehicles include cases where mortgage/lien could not be created on the year end.
- 3.4. The Council is separately maintaining bank accounts (including deposit accounts) in connection with EEPC Pension Fund, International Price Reimbursement Scheme etc. as a custodian only, which are not forming part of the Council's accounts.
- 3.5. a) The Council is maintaining a Joint Bank Account for making joint payments on behalf of itself and other occupants in relation to the office space acquired in the International Trade Facilitation Centre at Kolkata. As the Council is only acting as a custodian of this bank account, the same does not form part of its accounts.
 - b) The said bank account was opened for the convenience of these occupants in making those payments which are common in nature, such as, premises maintenance expenses, security services, electricity, water supply, lift maintenance etc. The funds required for such expenses are contributed by all these occupants on a mutually agreed basis.
- 3.6. No provision for Income Tax has been made in the accounts as the Council does not expect any liability on this account.
- 3.7. Contribution from participating members as shown in Note 2.12 includes amounts towards exhibitions, publicity, conferences etc.
- 3.8. In the absence of confirmation from the parties, various accounts like Loans & Advances, Deposits, Sundry Creditors etc. remain unconfirmed.
- 3.9 The novel coronavirus (COVID-19) had a very adverse impact on the activities of the Council, which majorly fell under the non-essential category and, thus, were subject to various pandemic related restrictions imposed by the Government. Due to such restrictions, the Council had to carry out most of its export promotional activities during the year in the virtual mode. This had a significant impact on the income of the Council, which is mainly in the form of Grant-in-Aid from the Government of India and contributions from the participating members. Since the situation did not appear to improve in the near future, the Council had to come out with a Voluntary Retirement Scheme for its employees with a view to reduce its substantial recurring cost on account of employee benefits expense. The Council will continue to closely monitor the future impact of this pandemic on its activities and shall take appropriate remedial measures, as and when considered necessary.



NOTE-3: OTHER EXPLANATORY INFORMATION (Contd.)

- The benefit of the Voluntary Retirement Scheme (VRS) for Employees is not for just one year, i.e., the current year, but is 3.10. also in the future years in the form of reduction in recurring cost on account of employee benefits expense. The provisions contained in the Income-tax Act also provides for amortization of the expenditure incurred under the Voluntary Retirement Scheme over a period of five years, apparently for this reason. Therefore, the Council has also decided to amortise its VRS expenditure over a period of five years. Accordingly, the un-amortised portion of VRS expenditure has been treated as asset in the Balance Sheet.
- 3.11 Previous year's figures have been regrouped/rearranged and nomenclature changed to make them comparable, as far as practicable, with those of current year.


